Kellermanns Receive Award from Dalai Lama

Scott and Carol Kellermann were among the 51 highly compassionate individuals honored as Unsung Heroes of Compassion 2014 by His Holiness the Dalai Lama. The honorees-24 women and 27 men-range in age from 16 to 85, work in 18 countries worldwide, and represent many ethnicities, cultures, faiths, and backgrounds. Gathered from the far corners of the earth, each demonstrates the timeless and universal human goodness celebrated by every wise culture.

The awards are sponsored by the nonprofit organization Wisdom in Action. The honorees are individuals who, through their loving kindness and service to others, have made their communities and our world a better place. In sharing the stories of each year's Unsung Heroes, Wisdom in Action seeks to increase awareness and inspire others to find their own paths toward compassionate action, thus helping our world become more harmonious, just, and peaceful.

At the event held in San Francisco on February 23, 2014, the Kellermanns were honored for their role as medical missionaries to the Batwa pygmies and other tribal groups in southwest





Grand Opening of Uganda Nursing School Bwindi

The official grand opening of Uganda Nursing School Bwindi (UNSB) will be held on May 23, 2014, on the UNSB campus. The nursing school, an affiliate of Uganda Christian University, is closely tied to Bwindi Community Hospital (BCH). Dr. Birungi Mutahunga, Executive Director of BCH, stated, "We aspire to produce

health professionals with clinical skills that have been practiced and refined through hands-on experience at the hospital. The nursing school will create a sustainable resource of highly qualified health professionals to provide treatment in remote underserved communities in the region."

The theme for the opening day will be "Health for All," reflecting the hospital and nursing school's vision to equip compassionate health care providers to serve this remote region of Uganda. The guest of honor will be the President of Uganda, Yoweri Kaguta Museveni. President Museveni will be accompanied by Prime Minister Amama Mbabazi and other dignitaries.

Dr. Scott Kellermann and his wife, Carol, will also attend the event. Dr. Kellermann founded BCH and was instrumental in establishing UNSB. Other key guests will include James D. Jameson and Stephen M. Wolf, major donors for the school's construction. Rotary International will be represented by Jerry Hall and Dr. Henry Bukwirwa.

UNSB's first term began in November 2013.

Bwindi Community Hospital Wins Awards

<u>Bwindi Community Hospital</u> (BCH) is widely considered one of the best hospitals in sub-Saharan Africa. Its innovative, sustainable programs are significantly improving healthcare in southwest Uganda.

The excellence of their programs was recently recognized when <u>Sustain for Life</u>'s garden partnership with BCH and another hospital was selected as a winner of the 2013 SEED Awards. The SEED Awards for Entrepreneurs in Sustainable Development is an annual awards program focused on the most promising, innovative, locally led start-up social and environmental entrepreneurs in countries with developing and emerging economies.

Sustain for Life's hospital gardens at Bwindi Community Hospital and St. Francis Hospital Mutolere in Kisoro District provide patients and staff with food while training communities in sustainable agriculture, nutrition, and sanitation. This helps them become selfsufficient, using low-cost solutions to combat hunger. The program generates income by selling surplus food produced in the gardens. It also helps participants replicate the skills they have learned in their own communities, increasing the impact of the enterprise.

Another honor was bestowed on BCH when it was acknowledged in 2013 by Public Opinions Uganda for its contribution towards the attainment of the Millennium Development Goals. Dr. Birungi Mutahunga, Executive Director of BCH, was a recipient of Public Opinion Uganda's Pearl of Africa Lifetime Achievement (PALITA) Award.

BCH has also been rated the best-performing hospital in Uganda by the Uganda Protestant Medical Bureau again, the hospital's fifth year in a row to receive this recognition.

Sponsor a Batwa Student at Bishops' School

In Uganda, education is not free; families must pay fees for their children to attend. School fees are far beyond the means of most indigenous Batwa pygmy families, especially for a good education at better schools.

Our Batwa Student Sponsorship Program provides support to Batwa students at Bishops' Primary Boarding School in Kanungu District, which has an excellent reputation throughout the region. Batwa students who attend Bishops' School tend to be among the brightest and hardest-working. They also receive additional teacher support to help ensure their academic success.

Sponsors may be individuals or groups. The cost is \$750 annually, 10% of which helps cover U.S. administrative costs and 90% of which goes directly to the program in Uganda.

This donation, which is tax-deductible in the U.S., covers all of a student's basic



needs, including tuition, fees, food, clothing, supplies, and transportation.

Sponsorship fees are pooled to provide assistance for all the Batwa children at Bishops' School. We ask that sponsors prayerfully consider a long-term commitment so a child has the stability of remaining in school without interruption.
